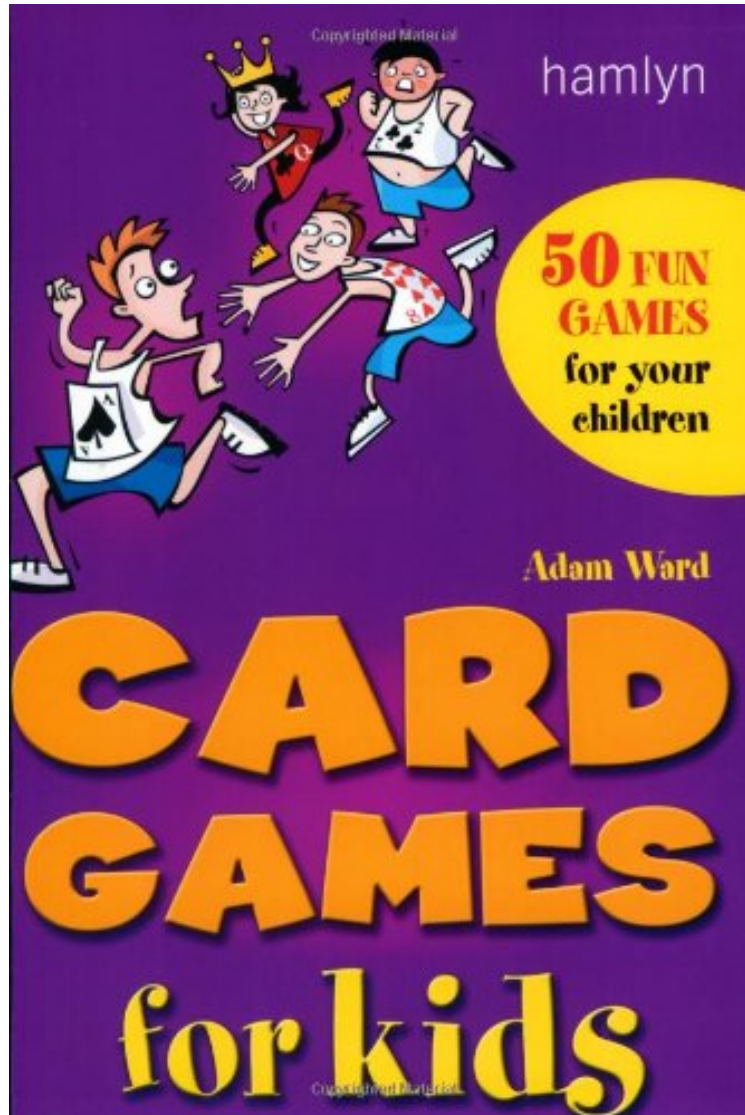

An introductory section covers card-playing basics, the educational value of cards, facts about numbers and sequence, advice on strategy and tactics, ideas for encouraging lateral thinking, and more.

Sectioned into games for one player, two players or more, for parties, and for prizes, there is something for everyone. An index sorts the games by age appropriateness and another organizes them by skill levels. Next, the object or aim is stated, as is how to start, how to play, and how to determine the winner. While other books teach card games, this one is particularly kid-friendly, with cartoon illustrations and easy-to-follow instructions.
