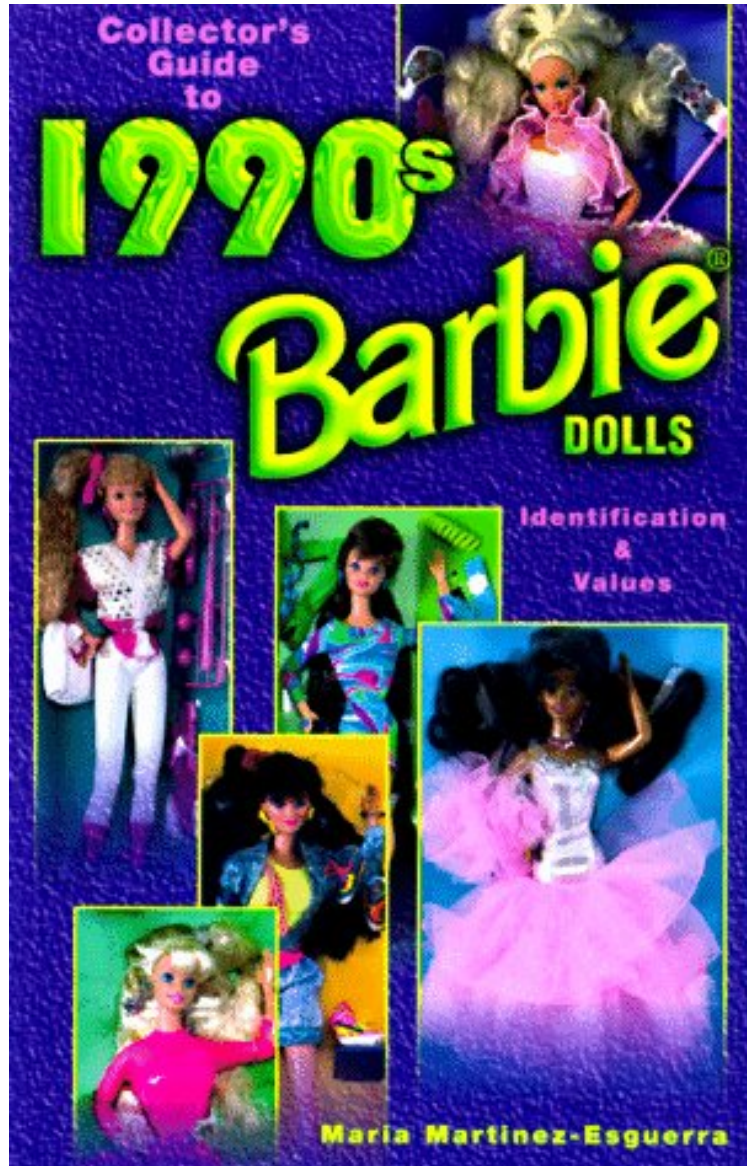

The author notes in her book that she is only focusing on Barbie and her friends. So for people who are looking for information on Barbie's family and Ken dolls, this book may not be for you. Some people have gripe about that the book only goes up to 1997. I don't really have a problem with that since that was the year I had last gotten a Barbie doll. The Hula Hair Barbie and the teen Skipper doll (can't remember the name of it). The book also lists only the dolls that were in the regular pink boxes for that decade, so don't expect to see any store exclusive or limited edition dolls. I give this book 5 stars because it listed most of the dolls that I still have to this very day, it even includes the dolls that I had wanted back then but never really got them. I think the author did a very good job listing all the Pink Box dolls. I don't think there is any that's been left out from that decade in particular. If you want a book that is a bit more detailed and informative than this one, I would probably suggest "The Barbie Doll Years" book in which I plan to get very soon. It details all the Ken, Skipper, Stacie, Kelly/Chelsea, etc dolls.
