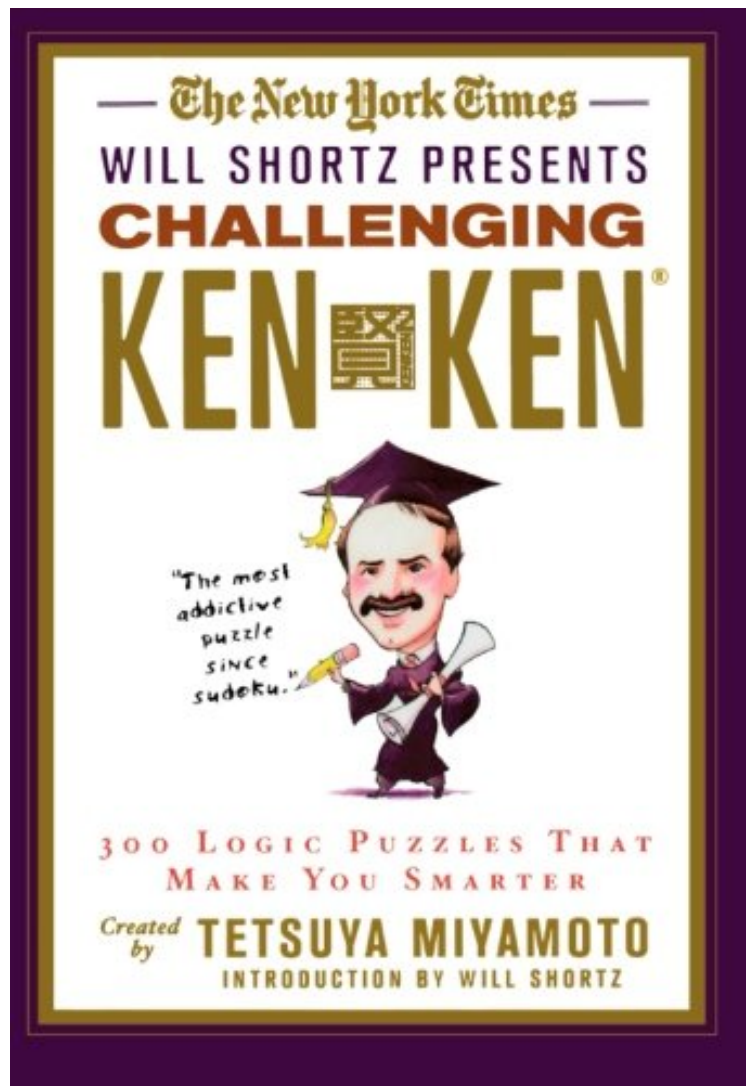

book has the potential for many hours of fun. I have only worked it for a couple of weeks, a couple of puzzles a day, and I am satisfied with it. The book contains only the 4x4 and the 6x6 puzzles, but it gives 150 of each. The puzzles are arranged from Easy up. The first 6 puzzles, Easy, in the 6x6 were not gimmes at all. I wish the book had that same harder cover that the Will Shortz "Gift of Kenken" book had. With the paperback being so thick and the 6x6 puzzles being so wide, I cannot easily hold it in my hands to work them.
